Vehicle Services





Did you know?

Vehicle tax and SORN can't be passed on when a vehicle changes hands.

This applies even if money isn't exchanged for the vehicle – for example between family members.

Buying a vehicle

When you buy a vehicle, you must tax the vehicle before you use it, or tell DVLA that the vehicle is off the road by making a Statutory Off Road Notification (SORN).

If it isn't taxed and it has no SORN, the vehicle may be clamped and you may receive a fine.

Selling a vehicle

As a current registered keeper, it's your responsibility to tell DVLA that you've sold the vehicle. Once you've told us (using the V5C registration certificate) you'll automatically get a refund in 4 to 6 weeks for any full calendar months that are left on the vehicle tax and we'll cancel any Direct Debit.

You'll need payment for your vehicle tax and one of the following:

- the New keeper slip (green slip) if you've just bought the vehicle
- a V5C registration certificate (log book), if you've received one in your name.

You might also need:

- your MOT test certificate (must be valid when tax starts)
- an insurance certificate or cover note in Northern Ireland.
