DO you have a DVLA story?

Letters aiming to help people avoid being fined for not taxing or declaring SORN on their cars are being issued by the DVLA.

Previously, no warning was issued until a letter demanding £80, or £40 lf prompt payment was made, arrived.

SORN (Statutory Off Road notification) has been a particular bugbear to the owners of several classics, who are most likely to forget to SORN a car when expected. Indeed three members of the Classic Car Weekly team admit to having been caught out and fined.

A DVLA representative told us that the new warnings were "customer service, encouraging people who are forgetful rather than malicious to get their vehicle taxed or SORNed."

The letters – or V211 documents to give them their proper title – have the warning 'Last chance' as a headline and details the numerous ways the owner can get a tax disc or make a SORN

declaration. They followed a "successful trial" in July and August 2009, and according to the DVLA representative's claims, have been around since last April.

Having said that, none of the CCW team or our colleagues on Classic Cars and Practical Classics had ever heard of the new documents, or received one in the post.

The DVLA also tells us. "It costs around 20p to issue each V211 letter and we are issuing between 200,000 and 250,000 per month. Therefore to issue 220,000 letters it costs approximately £44,000."

Added the DVLA representative: "The increased income received from vehicle excise duty following the issue of the V211 was far greater than the price of issuing the reminders, therefore these became business as usual from April 2010. It is also worth noting that the income DVLA collects from vehicle excise

duty is passed to the Treasury."

SORN was introduced on 31 January 1998. The scheme, much maligned in some quarters, means that a car must be registered annually as being off the road even if it isn't used.

The new reminder letters are sent off around two weeks after the beginning of the month in which car tax/SORN should have been declared when the liability falls due. Each is intended to prevent owners from forgetting their legal duty and gather revenue through increased taxation take-up. Once the DVLA has been notified of SORN an acknowledgment letter is sent.

An estimated 35 million vehicles are taxed or SORNED annually.
