Rubber Bumper V8 50th Anniversary Event



The V8 Register will be celebrating the 50-year anniversary of the production launch of the rubber bumper V8, which went on sale to the general public late in 1974. Planning is now well advanced for a display of pre-production and notable rubber bumper MGBGTV8s at the Inter-Club International Weekend at the Three Counties Showground in Malvern on the 28th to 30th June. The 1974 introduction of the rubber (more accurately, 'Bayflex 90' polyurethane) bumpers caused howls of dismay from traditionalist marque enthusiasts who bemoaned the apparent loss of the B's classic looks.

For the MGBGTV8, the rubber bumpers came two thirds of the way through the production run with only 735 cars soequipped.

V8 Register member John Davies has a preference for the later cars. John now has the second-built Black, 2102 car that was owned for many years by MGCC Director Dave Saunders. John thought 2024's 50th anniversary would be a suitable moment to revisit these interesting and rare machines. He is seeking fellow enthusiasts to bring theirs to Malvern in June, with a view to creating a display of 50 cars. John is delighted to report that 2101 will travel from Switzerland with Jacques and Stephanie Milliet. The last V8 built, Flamenco 2903 will also be present.
