



40 year rolling free road tax exemption

Successful tax class changes and free tax discs

Many members with MGV8s built in 1973 have report they managed to get a tax class change for their car but the experiences were varied. Some members like Paul Batho with a car first registered in 1973 were successful with an application made at a local Post Office. Paul reported he was "pleased to report that I was able to submit the change to Historic taxation class at my local post office and be issued with a 'free' tax disc". John Fry in Worcestershire reported that "the tax disc on my V8 expired vesterday, the 31st of March and I today went to my local Post Office today armed with the V5C, MOT certificate, insurance certificate and licence renewal. It could not have been simpler - the Post Office counter staff scanned in the V5C and their computer told them vehicle could be amended to Historic (which they were not able to do last week), changed the V5C to show this, then I signed - and voila a free tax disc! They sent

the V5C off to DVLA Swansea so a new one showing Historic Vehicle taxation class could be issued." But other members like Brian Western in Cornwall reported "my recent attempts to apply for a tax exemption disc from my local Post Office didn't work, they had never issued one before so I had to bundle all my relevant information up and consign it to the tender mercy of the DVLA in Swansea."

An alternative route is a direct application to DVLA Swansea and Mike Dunlop with an early V8 reported he received a new V5C noting "Historic Vehicle" and a few days later the postman delivered a free tax disc. Other members with cars first registered in 1974 but built in 1973 included a Heritage certificate in their application package and were successful in getting the V5C tax class changed and a NIL value tax disc.

What was happening to production at MG Plant around the end of 1973?
